




- ◆Business activities in Jalisco exceed US\$ 60 billion.

- *Jalisco is the second tourist destination in Mexico and the first for business tourism.



International Sister Schools Program

Partnerships between K-12 schools from Jalisco and abroad, to encourage the development of shared tasks with teachers and students; as well as the use of technology and the practice of other languages.

2 Week's program, in which students of Jalisco are involved in China's profound history and traditional culture. A group of Jalisco students participate every year, representing Mexico. Only Jalisco has an Sister-State/City agreement with Shanghai.



Jalisco - Bavaria International Internships Program Designed to provide an opportunity for higher education students, both form Jalisco and Bavaria, who are looking to learn new skills, practice a new language and gain practical knowledge in their field of study, in a foreign company or organization.

EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS



Binational Migrant Program (PROBEM)

This strategy is aimed for both children who began their studies in Jalisco and for any reason are going to live in the United States, as well as for those returning to our state after having lived for a time abroad.



Shanghai Summer Program-SISU

Created to support and encourage Jalisco students to learn and improve Chinese language and develop the ability to appreciate another culture.



Exchange program for master's degree, Kyung Hee University, South Korea

Graduate programs in Science & Technology, with the aim of supporting higher education and promote the exchange of students and teachers in these two important areas.

Exchange Program for High School Students Jalisco - Alberta, Canada Designed for students to build knowledge of each other's country, people, culture, and language, and acquire the global awareness and skills to facilitate their academic development.



Exchange Program for Spanish Teachers, Shanghai Municipal Education Commission 1 year program, to promote Spanish as a foreign language (teaching & learning), as well as Mexican culture and traditions, especially from Jalisco, in Shanghai secondary education institutions.



New Zeland Postgraduate Exchange Program Graduate programs in Agribusiness, with the aim of supporting higher education and promote the exchange of students and teachers in this key area for Jalisco's economy.

- 1. Building a more efficient and well-ordered management within the educational system.
- 2. Improvement of the educational indicators, emphasizing on reducing failure and drop-outs rates in junior high and high school levels.
- 3. Strengthening and widening educational services in high school and tech colleges.
- 4. Higher Education Consolidation.
- 5. Decrease illiteracy and reduce the educational lag in critical areas.
- 6. Standardize institutional instruction, training and updating programs for superintendents, supervisors, principals and teachers.
- 7. Improving teaching performance in Mathematics, Science and English, starting on basic education.
- 8. Strengthening Moral Principles and Ethics in Education.
