The State of Minority Males

- Majority of Hispanic and Black Males who pursue post-secondary education enroll in Hispanic Serving Institutes (Knox, 2017; IPEDS 2016)
- More Black Males Enroll in HSIs than in HBCUs and PBIs Combined (Knox, 2017; IPEDS, 2016)
- 14% of Black students and 30% of Latinos meet ACT college readiness math standards compared to 53% of white students (CCCSE, 2014)
- 20% of Latinos and 30% of African Americans ages 25 to 34 hold an associate's degree or higher in the United States (Lee & Ramson, 2011)
- Are the most engaged in tutoring and orientation sessions but report the lowest levels of success (CCCSE, 2014)
- Hispanic and African-American Males are among those students most at risk of failing to graduate from high school and succeed in college (Tyler, Sterling, Grays, 2013)

The State of Minority Males

Minority Males Face Numerous Socioeconomic & Personal Challenges

- Live in Poverty
- Unemployed
- Homeless
- Drug Usage/Additions
- Formerly Incarcerated
- Face undiagnosed mental Illness



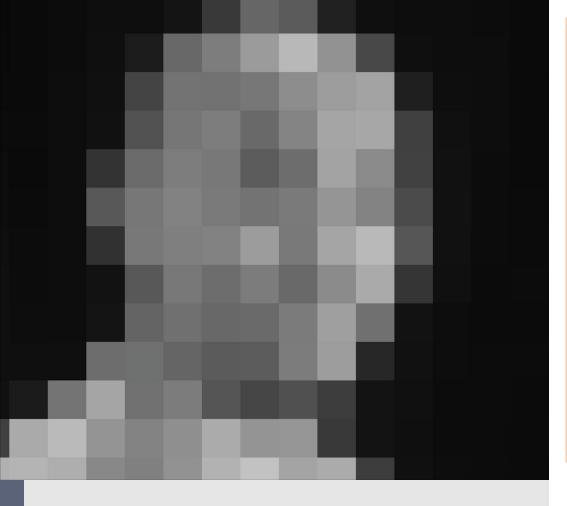
Equity and Access – National Focus

- Excelencia in Education
 - Focus on Latino student success.
- National Center for Inquiry & Improvement (NCII)
 - Provides support to colleges leading systemic changes.
- Opportunities for Youth
 - Focus on persons ages 16-24 who are not enrolled in college or not working.

 (Mom completed college, Dad did not)
- Raised by my Grandparents
 (neither whom went to college)
- Worked 20-25 Hours
 (High school and freshman year in college)
- Attended Last Choice College (could not afford my top 3 choices)
- Did not Understand Financial Aid

The City University of New York (CUNY) Bronx Community College (BCC)

CUNY

- Largest US Urban University System
- Pre-College to Graduate/Professional Schools
- Serves More Than 274,00 students
- System-Wide Minority Male Initiative (MMI)Program

BCC

- HSI/HSCC
- Located in the Poorest Congressional District in NY State
- Serves 12,000 Students
 (5,200 Minority Males)
- 80% of Entering Students test into 1 remedial course
- 64% Hispanic, 28% Black, 3% Asian
- In 2014, had 15 MMI Participants

Data Informed Decisions

- Minority Males at BCC (n=5,237)
- Created Target Group
- Completed 45 Credits
- Held 2.3 or greater GPA
- Had not enrolled at another CUNY College
- Had not registered at BCC for 2 semesters
- Resulted in 274 Students
- Presented Data along with LOST Revenue \$\$\$\$ TALKS!



Loss to BCC (PT Enrollment)

The following information represents losses to BCC based on 137 minority males (half of the 274) not enrolling Part-Time (6 credit hours) Fall 2014:

	Total Loss	\$174,296.20
Tuition (137 X \$1,170.00) =		\$160,290.00
Technology Fee (137 X \$50.00) =		\$6,800.00
Student Activity Fee (137 X \$52.60) =		\$7,206.20

Loss to BCC (FT Enrollment)

The following information represents losses to BCC based on 137 minority males (half of the 274) not enrolling Full-Time (6 credit hours) Fall 2014:

Total Loss	\$332,581.20
Tuition (137 X \$2250.00) =	\$308,250.00
Technology Fee (137 X \$100.00) =	\$13,700.00
Student Activity Fee (137 X \$77.60) =	\$10,631.20

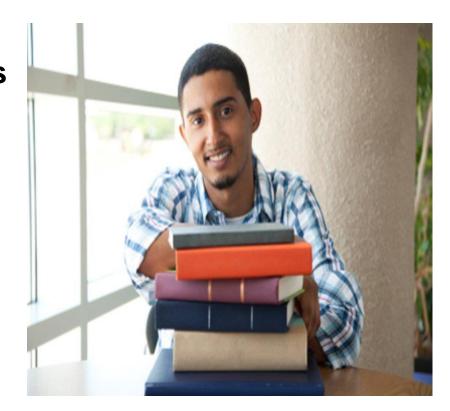

What Did We Do?

From Fall 2014 until Spring 2016, MOCI:

- Sent out Electronic Survey to Participants
- Held a 95% Retention Rate Among Regular Participants
- Increased Program Participants to More than 200
- Students Visited the Office more than 2000 Times
- GPAs Increased Every Semester



48% of Participants Graduated with an associate degree
