HISPANIC-SERVING INSTITUTIONS: ADVANCING LATINO SUCCESS IN HIGHER EDUCATION



HISPANICS IN THE U.S.

POPULATION

In 2022, 63.7 million Hispanics lived in the U.S., representing 19.1% of the U.S. population.

POPULATION BY STATES

California and Texas had the nation's largest Hispanic populations in 2022, followed by Florida, New York and Arizona. Colorado is among the top 10.

MEDIAN AGE

The median age of Hispanics was 30.7, compared to 38.9 of the general population in the U.S.

POPULATION UNDER 18 YEARS OF AGE

In the U.S., 31% of the Hispanic population is under 18 years of age, compared to 22% of the general population.

LABOR FORCE

By 2030, Hispanics are projected to account for 78% of net new workers.

ECONOMY

Hispanic buying power rose to nearly 2 trillion dollars in 2020.

The Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities undertakes extensive work at the federal and state levels to improve educational opportunities and outcomes for Hispanic students in higher education and Hispanic-Serving Institutions (HSIs).

HISPANIC ENROLLMENT IN HIGHER EDUCATION

In the last two decades, Hispanic enrollment at colleges and universities has significantly increased, more than doubling since 2000. Hispanic enrollment is expected to exceed 4 million students by 2026, far surpassing the growth rate of any other racial/ethnic group by over 10%.

HISPANIC-SERVING INSTITUTIONS

HSIs are defined by the Higher Education Act as degree-granting, notfor-profit institutions of higher education with Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) undergraduate enrollment of at least 25% Hispanic.

Given the significant share of Hispanic students and diverse student populations they serve, HSIs have become increasingly important to higher education and the U.S. workforce. Currently, there are 572 HSIs that educate over 5 million students nationwide. HSIs enroll two-thirds of all Hispanic undergraduate students and 62% of all Hispanic students in nonprofit postsecondary education.

A majority of HSIs are in urban areas and are concentrated geographically, with 80% (455) of these institutions located in six states and one territory: California (170), Florida (32), Illinois (31), New Mexico (24), New York (37), Texas (102) and Puerto Rico (59).

LATINOS IN COLORADO

Latinos are the fastest growing and largest ethnic group in Colorado, representing 22.5% of the state's population. Between 2000 and 2020, the Hispanic or Latino population in the state grew by 72%, twice the state's overall population growth of 35%. With 1.3 million Hispanics residing in the state, its Hispanic population is the eighth-largest in the nation.



COUNTIES WITH LARGE HISPANIC POPULATIONS

The Hispanic population has grown significantly in many of Colorado's counties. In the last decade, El Paso, Denver, Adams, Weld, and Pueblo Counties have experienced large Hispanic population increases.

Nearly 61% of Latinos are concentrated in Colorado's top five most populous counties. Each of the counties have close to 125,000 or more Latinos except for Jefferson County. Adams County, the fifth most populous county, has nearly 210,000 Latinos, followed by Denver County, second most populous, with more than 190,000 Latinos.

PK-12 EDUCATION

In the 2022-2023 school year, Colorado's PK-12 schools enrolled slightly over 880,000 students. Hispanic students represented more than one-third (35.0%) of the total student enrollment.

Hispanic student enrollment in Colorado's PK-12 schools has increased significantly over the past two decades, reflective of the demographic trends in the state. In the 2000-2001 school year, Hispanic students made up 22.0% of the total enrollment. By the 2019-2020 school year, they accounted for 34.3% of the state's PK-12 student population, an increase of 12 percentage points.

HIGHER EDUCATION

While the high school graduation rate for Hispanic students has increased in Colorado, their college-going rate has decreased after years of gains. Hispanics had a 14.3% decrease in their college-going rate from 44.2% in 2016 to 37.9% in 2021.

In fall 2021, public and private colleges and universities in Colorado enrolled close to 350,000 students. Hispanic students made up 19.7% of the state's total postsecondary enrollment.

HISPANIC-SERVING INSTITUTIONS IN COLORADO

Currently, there are 13 HSIs and 12 emerging HSIs. HSIs represent 33% of the state's nonprofit institutions of higher education and enroll 36% of all Hispanic students.

Over a third of the HSIs in Colorado are in Denver (3) and Pueblo (2) Counties. The rest of the HSIs are in following counties, with each having one HSI: Alamosa, Arapahoe, Garfield, Las Animas, Morgan, Otero, Prowers, and Weld Counties.






